OUR IMPACT

of regularly attending students (30 days or more per year) to the 21st Century Program showed grade improvements in mathematics and reading/English.

▼ Keystone First asthmatic students served showed a decrease in hospital visits for asthma. from **1.83** mean visits in 2016 to **1.71** mean hospital visits in 2017.

▼ 56% of students served through the brief treatment mental health services in the school based health centers showed decreased symptoms at discharge.

 Asthmatic students served showed a decrease in absenteeism, from 12.33 days in 2016 to 11.88 days in 2017.

▲ **94%** of asthmatic students who were evaluated postasthma care management showed improved lung functioning via their Asthma Control Test (ACT) score.

students were served in the Education Plus Health School Based Health Centers.

376 asthmatic students were assessed for their level of asthma control: 47% were deemed not well-controlled as measured by the Asthma Control Test (ACT) for deeper asthma care management.

48% of high school students were identified with sexual health risk for education and testing and treatment as needed for sexually transmitted infections.

The School Based Health Center nurse practitioners had 4,779 primary care visits with students.

The 21st Century Program served 263 Students at Building 21 High School.

107 high school students participated in the 21st Century summer academic program at Building 21 High School, a program launched just that spring. 78 incoming 9th graders participated in the day-long Freshmen Orientation hosted by Building 21 and the 21st Century program at the Outward Bound campus in Fairmount Park.

Education Plus Health partnered with **Diversified Community** Services to launch a new Harcum College I-LEAD communitybased site in South Philadelphia. 17 new students began August 2017 in the first Harcum College Human Services degree program at Diversified students Community Services.

Brief Treatment Therapy Launched in Three Pilot School **Based Health Centers**


A Master's level therapist served 19 students with brief treatment therapy services in Universal Audenried High School, Memphis Street Academy, and People for People Charter School. 56% of students served showed decreased symptoms as measured by the Pediatric Symptom Checklist.

Universal Mental Health Screening in the School Based Health Center

Education Plus Health launched universal mental health screening this year, integrated into the Statemandated screening process for all students in grades 5-12. 8% of 2,506 presented with risk through the PHQ2, further assessed by the School Nurse Practitioner using the Pediatric Symptom Checklist.
